Audition Tips!

1. Selecting Songs and/or Monologues

- a. Remember that selecting material is not meant to be stressful, and your directors want to see the material YOU love! This style of audition is meant to allow actors more freedom to perform something they are comfortable with.
- b. Choose material you will be excited to perform! Auditions can be nervewracking; the easiest way to calm nerves is to choose something you are comfortable with AND that you love doing!
- c. Look for something in the style of the show so the casting team can see what strengths you'll bring to this particular production. Or, if there's a specific role you're hoping to play, you may want to consider something that fits that character. For example, if you want to play the villain, you might try a song or monologue performed by a villain from another show.
- d. Find something that shows your range. You want to show the directors as much as you can in a short audition, so you can look for monologues with several different emotions or songs that demonstrate your vocal range. You can always cut lines out of a longer monologue to include just your favorite parts, or select the best 60-seconds of a longer song.

2. Preparation

- a. Memorization is great, but it's the least important part of your audition! Spend your time thinking deeper about your character and the story you're telling instead of on trying to memorize it perfectly. If you need to look at it during your audition, that's okay!
- b. For songs and monologues, make sure you can answer these basic questions about your character. Reading or watching the source material* (this means the play/musical/movie your material came from) can be super helpful, as you want to understand the context of your piece! If you can't find the source material or it doesn't provide answers, you can make up answers to these questions.
 - i. Who are they? How are they similar or different from you, and how can you portray this through your voice and/or body language?
 - ii. Who are they talking (or singing) to? How do they feel about this person?
 - iii. What do they want from the person they're talking to? This is called your *objective*.
 1. What will happen if they don't get what they want? These are called *stakes*.
 - iv. What do they do to get their objective? These are called *tactics*, and they are actions your character does to another character to get what they want (i.e. to beg, to convince, to alarm, to excite, to encourage, to guilt, to trick, etc.).
 - v. What has happened so far that led to your character delivering this song or monologue?

*Please note, while all the suggestions below are PG, some of the source material deals with more mature themes. Parents are encouraged to review the play or musical before allowing your performer to read it.

- c. Prepare enough that you feel comfortable, but don't overprepare or stress out! Your directors just want to get to know you and your strengths better; Stagebugz auditions are not a test or a competition!

3. Performance

- a. Start your performance with a slate, or an introduction of yourself. Tell us your name, age, and what you will be performing!

- b. It's valid and totally normal to be nervous! Just remember that we are there to support you, and we want you to do great. If you need a little bit of time to get comfortable, or you mess up and want to start over, that's okay!
- c. You're welcome to bring in your monologue or lyrics, but make sure to hold it low enough that we can see your face! If you need to read off the page, instead of burying your face in the paper, take a look at your next line, look up, deliver it, and then look at your next line.
- d. The most important thing we (and many directors) are looking for in an audition is your stage presence- what makes you, you! If you're singing, we want to see you acting at the same time! If you're acting, really commit to your character!
- e. Most importantly, have fun! Think of an audition not as something stressful, but as an opportunity to perform and do what you love!

Material Suggestions

The below songs and monologues are some suggestions for actors who would like some help finding material that fits them. This is by no means an exhaustive list; you are welcome to perform any other material you would like if you don't find something here or already had a piece in mind!

*Please note, monologues can be changed to fit any gender or age, so don't feel restricted if there is one you love but the character is different from you. Songs can be as well, though you may need to sing it up or down an octave to make sure it fits your range and you don't have to strain your voice!
